I will keep you posted as to when this will happen.

What medium-sized tree should I consider?

There are 199 actual home lots in our 'Park' and there are likely almost as many good to great choices for trees. Here is a list of what a tree can do for you and the environment:

- ✓ 1 medium-sized tree can absorb an average of 48 lbs. of CO₂ in a year.
- ✓ 1 medium-sized tree that shades a house can reduce your power consumption by up to 5%.
- ✓ 1 medium-sized native Oak (*Quercus*) tree in Florida can host up to 500 different species of moths and butterflies. These moths and butterflies are key sources of food for many local and migrating songbirds.
- ✓ Many medium-sized trees produce food for both humans and birds.

Here are a few choices to consider:

1. **Fringe Tree (*Chionanthus virginicus*)** – grows to 20' has fringe-like white flowers in the spring followed by olive-shaped fruit in the summer/fall. It is slow growing and drought-tolerant which along with its ultimate height being 20', make it a great choice for our park.



Additionally, it is a deciduous tree which means it loses its leaves each fall which gives the plant a different look in the winter months.

2. **Southern Magnolia (*Magnolia grandiflora*)** – grows to 30' and has distinctive flowers



that look like its' sister plant the Saucer Magnolia. It has also very distinctive leaves that are thick as well as glossy green on the top and velvety brown on the underside. It too is slow growing which again makes it a good choice and of course you have the added benefit of

being able to use some of the unwanted branches for your winter decorating.

3. **Laurel Oak (Quercus laurifolia)** – grows to 35’ and is one of the most sought-after



trees by as many as 500 species of moths and butterflies. Native Oaks – like this Laurel Oak and its cousin the Live Oak - are key host plants and are so very important to food sources for many birds throughout Florida. Although a larger tree than the Magnolia or the Fringe Tree, it has been included because of its importance for supporting native moth and butterfly and subsequently, insect populations that are

critical for the well-being of our environment. Since this plant is ‘semi-evergreen’ it is an important consideration that it casts off its leaves in late winter and early spring.

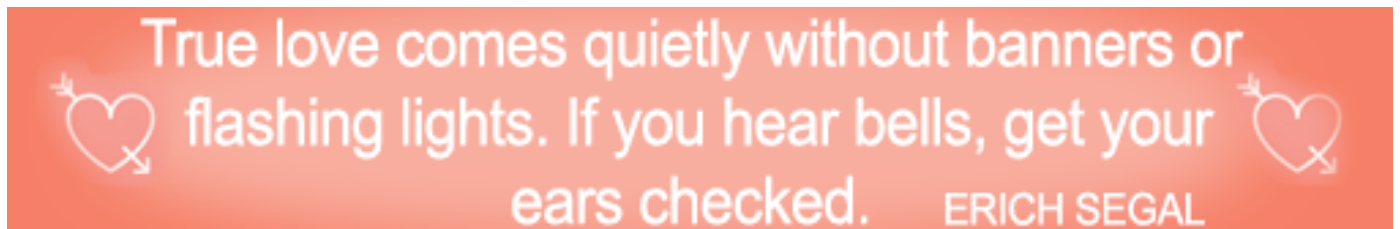
When choosing a tree AND choosing a planting location, it is important to consider how large the tree will become, that you should plant in a location that will keep your tree off your neighbor’s lot and consider a location that will optimize the shade you will gain from the tree (as much as you are able to). Newly planted trees should be watered well after planting and for the next 60 days and fertilized lightly in the first spring and summer. The board of directors also asks that no significantly sized tree be planted within 8 feet of your rear property line as all water and septic and most electric, cable and telephone service lines are within that space on one of both lots (as is the case).

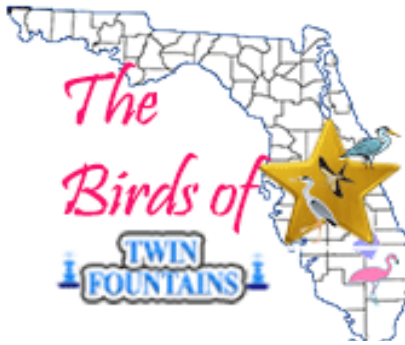

It has been called “the coolest bird on the planet.” It is quite unmistakable as it flies with its striking shape and its extraordinarily graceful flight. You may have seen them here in Twin Fountains in early March, as it hangs motionless in the air, gliding, rolling upside down, then suddenly soaring high up in the air with barely any effort or motion of its wings.

So, what is this bird? It is called a Swallow-tailed Kite.

The kite is considered a migratory raptor and moves from its South America home to Central America, and about 3% of its population occasionally graces the subtropical areas in Florida (like Lake Wales), tropical areas like South Florida, and southernmost Texas to breed, then returning to South America where it will spend its summer, autumn and winter seasons.



The kite is about 22 to 24 inches with blue gray on its back. Its head and underparts are all white with a long forked black tail. It is about the size of a crow, about half the size of a Mallard. It has a long bill and white wing linings.



Mating and nesting occur in Late February to Early March. During their first week after hatching, fledglings are brooded mostly by the female with the male assisting periodically while the female hunts and brings food to the nest, which is normally the male’s job. Baby Kites are considered nest-bound for the first 5 weeks, then will fly

between the fifth and sixth weeks.

The Kite's diet consists of insects like dragonflies, wasps, beetles, cicada's grasshoppers, Palmetto bugs and many others. These guys are extremely agile and maneuverable in flight and catches its prey in the air with very little effort. Its agility is so precise that it can grab an insect or baby bird from a twig or leaf without even pausing. It even grabs nestling birds right out of their nests in its agile maneuvers. The Kite will eat stinging insects and have even been observed returning to their nests with an entire hornet's nest, eating the larvae and weaving some of the hornet nest into its own nest. Their stomachs are thicker and spongier than the average raptor stomach but have no difficulty eating these stinging wasps. They drink by skimming the water as they fly.



The Swallow-tailed Kite is considered a monogamous pair and only spends time apart for brief times, then join each other during migrations to nesting locations. Courtship involves aerial chases, and the male will feed the female. The Kite mates from March to May, laying about 2 to 4 eggs. The eggs incubate for about 28 days.



Their nests are built with sticks and woven thoroughly with Spanish Moss and are usually found at or near the tops of Loblolly Pines or in bald cypress tree overlooking swampy areas where they gather their food. These nests are placed very high in the trees. Although this high placement may cause susceptibility to high winds and avian predators, they do have many advantages to lower placed nests. They have much easier access to their prey since their swift flight and great agility allows them to overtake their prey by complete surprise. Being in the top of the trees, the limbs are more

closely spaced, so there is less chance of nest damage from fires, and fewer mosquitos. However, broken and wind-tossed nests are a common cause of nesting failure. Therefore, Kites are constantly adding nesting material to strengthen and secure the nests and possibly cover excrement.



To find Swallow-Tailed Kites, keep your eyes on the skies over Twin Fountains in March as these light and graceful birds spend most of their days air bound, usually skimming the treetops or soaring high up looking for insects that like to fly high in the sky. Remember that the Kite is only here in late February to early March, so summer is not the time you'll find

them. They'll be doing most of their living in South America!

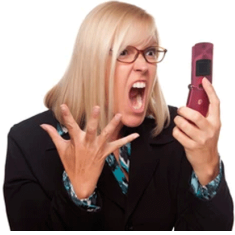

RESOLVING PROBLEMS WITH MOBILE PHONE RECEPTION

One of the ongoing issues in Twin Fountains is poor mobile phone reception in the park. It seems that many residents have particularly weak

reception while inside their home, under their carport, or inside their Florida Room.

We reached out to Spectrum to enquire what, if anything, might be possible to enhance overall mobile phone reception. We asked if erecting a booster somewhere in the 'Park' or installing some type of antenna might be a solution. They explained that the issue of weak reception has more to do with our 'Park' being in a low area and Wi-Fi towers being a significant distance away from us. They explained that adding an antenna or any kind of booster would have no effect as the signal arriving at the 'Park' was the issue.

They did offer a suggestion. Since we entered a bulk contract with Spectrum, every home has – or has access to – Wi-Fi as part of their monthly maintenance fees. Since this is the case, they recommended that every resident with a mobile phone or tablet change their settings to allow their phones to access Wi-Fi Calling. In brief, this will allow your mobile phone to make use of the Wi-Fi in your home to make and receive calls rather than a mobile phone tower that is several miles away.

This same Wi-Fi Calling function can be used anywhere you go where there is Wi-Fi, and you sign into the network. For example, Publix, Walmart, Wendy's, McDonalds, and many other locations have free Wi-Fi so if you sign into their network, you can use this feature to enhance the reception of your mobile phone at many locations. * Remember that this free Wi-fi is NOT always secure so do not use a public Wi-fi to pay your bills or transfer fund's, etc. Most people use either an Apple iPhone or an Android phone so below are links to instructions on how to access Wi-Fi Calling on your phone. And of

course, you might want to contact your service provider to have them walk you through how to make this simple change. Here are the links!

Switching to Wi-Fi Calling will mean fewer dropped calls and you won't have to go outside to get reception!
